Due to various family and personal circumstances they are not yet ready to live on their own in the community, but no longer need the 24-hour care that they have needed while undergoing rehabilitation in our longterm program. So, without further ado, we are pleased to announce the formation of our new College/ **Transition Program!** This program is simply an extension of our long-term care initiative. The ladies in this program will live on campus at My Refuge House but will leave campus on their own to travel to and from University. They will receive care, guidance and support from staff, but will now have the opportunity to test out their skills as responsible young adults as they navigate friendships, decisionmaking and public transportation on their own. Please keep the six of them in your thoughts and prayers as this is a daunting transition for them! My Refuge House has set up a Scholarship Fund to assist with school fees. # Community Outreach in Cebu, Philippines

My Refuge House has seen the value of not only restoring survivors of commercial sexual exploitation (CSE) and abuse, but also spreading awareness and educating the populace of said issues. Reaching out to the masses and empowering them to become involved, increase knowledge, and equip bystanders were goals that MRH deemed necessary to be undertaken. With these objectives in mind the community outreach program was born with the gracious help of Leadership Worth Following, who donated \$20,000 for the next two years of operation to make the dream of reaching out to the community come into fruition.

We began our preparation efforts to combat the injustices of CSE and abuse by conducting ongoing research through surveys and interviews to assess respondents' knowledge of and attitudes towards CSE, abuse, and community resources. The data that we can extract from this research will be beneficial to determine how to empower students, parent leaders, and other community volunteers. Results of our study will also become part of

the training manual, devised to serve as a vital tool in equipping community trainers to become the new voices for the fight against CSE and abuse.

We have incorporated the shadowing of other Non Profits in our plan to figure out how other organizations with community outreach programs operate in the field and what target populations they cater to. Insights from the shadowing activities will be utilized in planning for future MRH outreach to avoid duplication of services rendered to the community by our partners.
